A native of Cheyenne, Wyoming Dan Ostermiller has been based in Loveland, Colorado for over forty years and was given his first solo exhibition in 1980. He has been a primary driver of Loveland's active sculpture scene, where over 200 sculptors reside, and over 300 other artisans are employed. Generous by nature, committed to fostering other artists and the sculpture field as a whole, Ostermiller is a member of the Society of Animal Artists and Allied Artists of America. He is a fellow and served as First Vice-President of the National Sculpture Society. His award-winning works have been honored with many solo exhibitions around the U.S. and beyond and are held within the permanent collections of major museums.
